Hello all,

Harold of the Hill toppers has a beautiful Sukoi. It is cream and green color and I almost caught a fly in my mouth when he told me it was an ARF. They are covering them with real covering now. The glue is really on the joint where it was intended. I really like to build them, but the free time is becoming increasingly difficult. ARF's are not big and not real competitive I said to Harold. He reminded me that the Fiber classics 40% planes are winning all types of competitions and they are ARF. "The cost is much higher", someone said. Well when you consider the price of everything to finish a kit, some of the ARF's cost about the same. If you even think about putting any of your time into the equation, the ARF's can definitely be cheaper. I have a few planes now. My trainer and Space walker are ARF's. Joshua's Champion is an ARF and the rest are kits. Two of the ARF's we have are older and, (how can I say it?), are not built as well as the ones are built now.

I had another ARF but it broke in half while I was doing a vertical snap. (Although I had previously tested its strength). The new ARF's are worth fixing. If you have a hard landing, (possibly inverted or in knife edge), they are so nice you may want to repair them to fly again. Now, due to the fact that they are using "real" covering, you can fix them and still have them look and fly well.

It's up to you. I have three kits to build this winter and a few more in the box. I enjoy building them. I am certain a few members will scratch build some new planes this winter. Some of you may build an ARF. Either way, getting any of those to fly next winter is an accomplishment in itself. So you should feel proud and happy when they fly. I hope you do, I love seeing the smile when your new plane does its first flight.

Also, please remember to be a good neighbor at the field. Our field is being encroached upon, possibly from more than one direction, and it is important that we stick to our own rules and also be good neighbors. We have an excellent flying site and we would like to keep it. I have appointed a Skymaster as the Bald Mountain liaison. Bill Stark has

accepted the position and I think he is a perfect match. This position was, I believe, Darrell's idea, (Great Idea), and Bill can help communicate with the park officials and help with any issues that come up or are ongoing. This is a presidential appointment, effective as of 9/17/2001. This person will also provide encouragement to the DNR in requests we have put before them and report to the board, who makes the final decisions. I thank Bill for accepting this annual position that would be up again at the end of 2002. The new president will decide who should be in this position then, as with the existing Chief Flight Instructor and the Newsletter Editor. Skymaster's 2002 Officers

November is our annual Elections for club officers for 2002. For those new to the club, or others considering pitching in, you may be wondering what the positions are in the club – and what they do...

The following are elected at our November meeting for a one year term. The descriptions are from our bylaws with some additional comments in italics:

- a) **President**: The President is the Senior Officer of the Club and presides at all Club meetings and functions. He/she has the power to make legal contracts in the name of the Club, subject to the approval of a two-thirds vote of the members of the Executive Operating Committee.
- b) **Vice-President**: The Vice-President acts in the capacity of an Assistant President, and assumes the duties of any Club Officer during their absence at Club functions. Should the Office of the President become vacant, the Vice-President automatically becomes the new President for the balance of the year. *The Vice-President has responsibilities for coordinating field maintenance activities.*
- c) **Secretary**: The Secretary keeps an accurate record of the attendance and minutes of each meeting. He/she is responsible for Club correspondence, and for Club contest records. The Secretary serves as the Club Ballot Officer.
- d) **Treasurer**: The Treasurer, along with the President, has the authority to write checks and make deposits for the Club. The Treasurer is authorized to receive contributions, grants, donations, or bequests from any individuals, institutions, or estates, and hold same in the name of the Club, to be used for either endowment purposes or operating expenses. He/she is responsible for meeting all financial obligations of the Club. The Treasurer makes periodic financial reports to the membership..

The elected officers above plus all past Presidents still members in good standing makes up the voting members of the Executive Committee.

In addition to the elected positions above, the following positions are Presidential Appointments and are non-voting members of the Executive Committee:

- a) **Bald Mountain Park Liason** coordinate communication and activities with the DNR at Bald Mountain Recreation Area. This is a new appointment in 2001.
- **b)** Chief Flight Instructor coordinate our flight training activities.
- c) Newsletter Editor produce this newsletter each month...






