

PROP WASH...

Take it to the limit...

Well, those of you old enough (and that is most of you reading this!) to remember these lines from a well known hit from the group the "Eagles" in the 70's may wonder why I chose this title for this month's column. Well, I am writing this just after our Fun Fly and this was the most appropriate name I could contrive.

In my case here, the "limit" I am referring to are the limits we put on ourselves in this hobby of ours. I promise not to make this a lecture on safety, that is not my point. What I would like you to all think about is that some limits should be pushed, and some should be a bit more firm. Each year I watch the Fun Fly, I get the idea that I should go into the landing gear business, as I watch at least a dozen pilots transform their ships into handlaunch models during an event that has some kind of points for spot landing. As pilots in this contest we get the "land it here no matter what" syndrome and the down elevator gets a healthy workout. (We will of course not discuss my even larger excesses here, including my famous killing of a perfectly good Ultimate Bipe whilst attempting to win top gun a few years back!)

While I have to smile at the competitive nature of those pilots in the fun fly, it often causes me to think about how I can add

a little spice to my flying. I have been changing what I have built over the last year, and it is focusing away from boring holes in the sky with an aerobatic ship. Now mind you, I certainly won't stop tumbling my DP Ultimate Bipe around, but I have 3 WWII 1/5 scale ships in various stages of development and taking it to the limit for me will be to master scale flight, including that most difficult of maneuvers, the scale take-off. My point is here that this mode I have chosen will definitely stretch my limit, and I hope to convince you to take this plunge once in awhile. It could be Warbirds, it could be helicopters, whatever, but once you have flown "sport" for a bit and are comfortable, consider other aspects of our broad hobby. For example, control line has always appealed to me, and perhaps you could try a control line ship at our field. It is after all, one of the less expensive forms of flying!

You could also take new limits in sport flying. I have been instructing a few pilots in aerobatics (pretty loosely though) and this can be quite an adventure. Most of the intermediate ships I see at the field are more than capable of some fun tumbles or big loops and it does not cost anything other than gas to give some of these maneuvers a try (unless of course you attempt a 100 foot radius loop at only 75 feet of altitude, as I witnessed last student night!)

If you look at when people leave the hobby, one group is what I call the "been there, done that" mentality. After about 2-3 years, they get a bit bored with this hobby and they go on to some other challenge. This group would benefit most from trying a different form of the hobby, and if that fails, then perhaps they really should move on. Personally, it has taken me nearly ten years to be comfortable sport flying and it is definitely time for me to move on to other aspects of this hobby.

Of course we must remain cognizant of the foolhardy ways to stretch our limits. For example, I have recently purchased a used 30-size helicopter and I will be back to student mode. It would be a dangerous and foolhardy challenge for me to go out and believe that I could fly this thing without lots of help. This is not taking it to the limit, this would be taking it to the repair shop! – All of you know where this limit is for yourselves – 'nuff said on that one.

So hopefully, before this flying season is out, you will see me attempting some new things with both my DP Bipe, and even attempting to hover that instrument of the devil (i.e. helicopter), and I will see some of you spinning a new tune as well!

Hope you leave the field with as many pieces as you came with.




