September is Here Already and the Big Float Fly is on Top of Us!


The "Corn Roast - Family Picnic" is behind us. We had perfect weather, great roasted corn (thanks to Chef Gary [as in Weaks]), an excit-


His continues to be a popular event and I hope all enjoyed it, even if we did have a few crashes (and one near one!) –see you all next year with a new set of wings



PROP WASH...

"A most dangerous time"

Hi All, As you read this, the "summer" flying season at the field will be almost over and we will have a few (perhaps several) newly signed off pilots in the club. If you are newly signed off, this is the most dangerous time for you. Let me explain.

At this point in your flying career, it is analogous to when you just got your driver's license. You know enough to take controls, but experience and instinct are still immature. I have seen more ships lost in the 6-12 months following a sign off than any other time. I am not sure if this is an ego thing, or whatever, but I have seen it over my 10 years in the club with regularity.


Let me provide a few suggestions to help out at this point if you find your pilot card still new and shiny.

- Burn several tanks of gas practicing just approaches to landing
- 2) Burn several tanks of gas practicing approaches with full stop landings
- 3) Burn several tanks of gas with unusual attitude recovery

pilots, For most knocking time still occurs during landing. I still see veteran pilots get a little more nervous, and all of us screw up a landing or two with regularity. One of the differences though is that as you gain more experience, you are able to interpret and respond sooner when you need to take corrective action. As you become more comfortable landing, you will instinctually know your ships power off glide, how much flare, altitude to begin, etc. Equally important, you will be able to get the ship into correct landing configuration (speed, altitude, trim, etc.) sooner. I can find no substitute here other than lots and lots of landing practice. I went through 2-3 gallons of fuel with my trainer after sign off (8 ounces at a time on an I was comfortable Eagle II). (and sick of it!) after those three gallons, but I was considerably less nervous and turned my attention to having fun in the sky and not concerning myself with bringing the ship down. It is difficult for me to over-emphasize to all of you who are still a bit nervous on landing the value of just shooting landings all day on several tanks of gas can do to help you out. It is still O.K. to have a buddy box and an instructor help you out (By the way, only an instructor can be at the other end of a buddy box at our field)

My next suggestion of unusual attitude recovery is also to help you gain confidence in handling of your ship. I would first suggest that you get on a buddy box and get 3-4 mistakes high. At this point have your instructor get the ship in all kinds of po-

sitions (inverted, spins, etc.) and your job is to get the ship back to straight and level flight. Try this for at least a gallon of fuel with progressively more challenging attempts to get the ship recovered. If you will do this, I can guarantee you will feel much more comfortable with any plane you fly, as recovery will move into the instinctual mode for you rather than hoping you have enough time to think about a response. I had to reply 100% on instinct at our scale meet when the ship I was flying had intermittent radio failure, There was no time to process input commands. This skill can be learned by all of you, and all it takes is lots of practice.

I once read a comment from a fellow flyer to a beginner who asked how to become a good pilot, and the response still resonates with me today. The instructions to becoming a good pilot are written at the bottom of a 55-gallon drum of fuel.

Finally, it is more than O.K. to continue to ask a flight instructor for help even though you are signed off. In fact it shows good judgment.

Hope you leave the field with the same number of pieces you brought.
