


Hi All,

Well. I took a few months off to take care of some changes for me, but I am back and ready to fill the pages up of the newsletter. One of the things I will need some help on is some suggestions was always an excitement about discov- covered and if you look closer than 10 for some upcoming columns as I am running out of things to say – I will have to start repeating myself. Speaking of repeating myself, a few people have asked me to go over how our radios work and some simple programming for the ever increasing digital age – I am undecided if I want to punish you all by writing about that again.

I always like to pontificate about the Toledo Weak Signals extravaganza in the April column and this month is no exception. I have noticed some changes ARFs on the main floor. I suspect that in our hobby take firm hold.

For the first time for me, I changed the two days I normally attend to Friday and Sunday. Normally, I am there Friday and Saturday, but other commitments made Sunday the only option I had.

First, the swap meet. I have watched over the last 5 years as the Toledo swap meet has gradually shrank in size and change in makeup of vendors. When I first started going ~10 years ago, both upstairs and downstairs were full of actual professional sellers, but the actual guys who make a living selling RC gear continue to diminish in the swap meet. I saw a lot of individuals selling a lot of old tired equipment (if you could call it that) – The demand for multiple tables by hobby stores and individuals who actually try to make money at this hobby used to be huge. Earlier times also had all of the side rooms open with tables. For the last few years, several of the rooms adjacent to the main hall have been off limits to the swap meet as they are rented out to full time enterprises. Our hobby has always been evolving and changing, but the trends I see upstairs are a little sad for me. One thing I really used to enjoy upstairs were the large number of guys like you and me who had an idea for a better mouse trap who came to Toledo and got a cheap table upstairs - I used

to spend most of one day up at the swap meet looking at the cottage industries that always seemed to represent themselves up there – I continue to see less of this upstairs each year. There ering a great widget that would make my building easier or allow me to try a new way to solve something.

The other area I noticed a change in is the number and type of aircraft for sale upstairs. I am not as firm on this belief, but I feel the number of aircraft for sale in the swap meet was small and most part, all of these vendors are not there were minimal pickings up there. I saw a large number of good old fashioned kits with owners asking for the same or more than the guys selling most of those kits went home with their owner.

The last biggest change I saw was the lack of scale documentation. My other favorite task up in the swap meet used to be hunting under tables and looking in the nooks and crannies of tables for great scale documentation that they were selling, but had tucked away under the table. I searched extensively and found only a few tables that even had anything to look at. Alas, my paper list of documentation to get did not get a single cross out - I got skunked this year. All in all, I was only upstairs for a few hours on Friday. Sunday morning the swap meet was already dead, with the only people up there being scavengers hoping to get some guy to give away something. I think it was totally empty by lunch on Sunday.

The main floor continues to hold my interest for a full day though and I am beginning to wonder if I can make Toledo a one day affair now, as I used to budget one day for the swap meet (or first looked around at 11AM on Sunday at least $\frac{1}{2}$ day) and one day for the main floor.

To me it is now clear that ARFs have become the standard way we are now going to see most of our new airplanes available. I am of the transitional age in our hobby, growing up and starting by building my ships – My first ARF

did not come until several years into the hobby. It is no longer relevant to ask if ARFs will continue to grow in popularity. Personally, I prefer to buy an ARF for an aerobatic ship, and will most often opt for a kit or plans for a scale attempt. ARFs continue to climb in quality and they passed my building (especially covering) capabilities long ago. If you see me flying a ship that looks well covered, it should be a strong clue to you that it is an ARF. I still fly 2 planes that I feet away, you will be able to tell they are my work ...

One thing I like to see is that ARFs have made a great equalizer on our hobby. When I joined, there were a few giants in the kit business. Great planes, Top Flite, Goldberg and SIG. For the on the leading edge anymore and most of the growth is coming from newer companies with different ideas. In defense of the companies above, the investment necessary to create a new design and get it to market is now comparatively low. The Top flites of the world had some major investments to get a design out and they carry some of that infrastructure even now. Unfortunately, I now believe that within perhaps 5 years, we will have essentially two choices for buying a new plane. One obviously will be an ARF, the second will be a set of plans – Other than scale (non-aerobatic scale at that), there is no margin or room left for the kit companies. They are dying a slow death and it pains me to see it. The 4 biggies I mention above appear to be following partial paths to modernize their offerings, but the carnage from waiting to long or hedging their bets is going to kill one or more of them within the next 2 vears I believe.

Being on the main floor on Sunday was guite surprising. Typically, I am used to elbow to elbow moving in all the aisles and it was amazing to me to see the wide open aisles on Sunday – I must confess I was a bit stunned when I and was one of only abut 10 people in whole row. I saw a hint of this on Friday afternoon as the show thinned out then as well. Now, I did not take long to get over my surprise and realize I had a great opportunity to talk with some of these guys who were always way to (Continued on page 5)

busy on Friday and Saturday. I had some long conversations with some of the scale greats out there and finally cornered some one from Horizon hobby long enough to have him explain the mystery of why Saito is now making soft threaded mufflers for their four strokes - That one was burning my rear end as to why they took the cheap way out. Obviously, the guy at Horizon had a different opinion, but since I was able to speak with him for awhile I asked him to explain why they swapped over and I finally half-agreed that they really had no choice (if you are interested it is because of a couple of things, not the least of which is the difficulty Saito now has getting the older alloy) The point is I would have never had this opportunity on a Friday or Saturday - That was neat and I think I will go down on Sunday again next year. Either that or I might try to make Toledo one day - all Day Friday, since the swap meet effectively opens 2 hours before the main show.

The wheels of change continue to roll in our hobby gents, and if you see something you like that is from a small vendor or is not an ARF and you like it. I would strongly encourage you to grab it up even if you are not ready to use it yet – Chances are it will not be around next year!

Hope you leave the field with the same number of pieces you arrive with Joe Finkelstine

1) Crazy Taxi - Pop all four balloons while taxing you must go thru the gate before popping the balloon, then exit thru the gate to the next balloon.

2) **<u>Timed flight without timers</u>** - The pilot places plane at start/finish line, at "Go" takes off, then must land and cross finish line in exactly "120" seconds. Pilot with elapsed time closest to goal wins.

(3) <u>Roops</u> - Take off, do one roll, one loop, Touch & Go (5 times), then land. Fastest time wins.

(4) <u>Taxi around pylon course</u> - Three pylons set in a line on the runway spaced at least 100 feet apart, with a chalked "start/finish line" near the middle of the field. Pilot gets engine running, sets it to idle, places aircraft at start/finish line, sets tx on ground. Starter gives the "Go", pilot picks up tx, steers aircraft around the pylons (sort of a figure-8 path) then crosses finish line. Best time wins.

5) **<u>R/C Golf</u>** - Attach cup w/ball on plane, take off, 2 loops then drop ball on field then land time stops. Then you must Golf the ball into the hole. 10 seconds are added to your score for every stroke..

(6) <u>Oh Crap</u>s - Roll the dice, take off time starts, 3 loops, 3 rolls, 3 spins land roll dice till you get your starting number.

(7) **<u>Limbo lower now</u>** - 3 passes per flight, pilots that tie go to the next lower round..

INSTRUCTOR NOTES

Well it's that time of the year again. Spring is upon us. For most of us, the coming warm days and gentle winds will bring us out of hibernation and out to the field. This is also the time that we begin our Student Instruction for the year. On this note, I would like to point out areas that all Instructors need to be concerned with:

All Instructors are Sound and Safety Monitors. Do not hesitate to address these issues when needed.

When enforcing Safety Rules, please be courteous but firm. It is better to have someone unhappy, rather than the cause of an injury to themselves or others.

When enforcing Sound Rules, assure that our DB Level is maintained.

When utilizing a Buddy Box or not, Instructors are to take full control of the aircraft in order to prevent:

Flying over the flight line

Landing in trees

Flying out too far

Damaging or destruction of any aircraft while instructing our students in Take Offs and Landings. <u>The Frequency Pin must be pulled at all times!!!</u>

Always monitor our new pilots and when necessary give immediate advice or assistance. Act as a "Spotter" when required

• Instructors to enforce the Safety Rules that:

oOnly Pilots are allowed in the Pit Area and on the Flight Line. Children should not be playing in the Pit Area.

Spectators are not allowed on the field side of the fence.

The Instructor must control the pace at which each student progresses. As an example; do not start to teach "how to take off or land" when the student has not mastered good flight control. Encourage Students to be patient.

It takes two (2) Instructors to sign-off a Student .
