15th Annual Midwest Regional Float Fly by Greg Cardillo

Our 15th Annual Midwest Regional Float Fly has come and gone...and what a wonderful weekend we had! The weather was on our side, as we had a beautiful September weekend in southeast Michigan! 86 pilots and well over 100 planes took to the water and air in Brighton, Michigan.

An event of this size doesn't take place without a lot of help... While I couldn't possibly single out everyone without missing many – and I do thank everyone that helped for their time and effort, I wanted to pass along special thanks to those that stepped up to coordinate different areas of our event.

Setup/Teardown: Dave Shea led the charge to get the site ready for us. He and his crew set up the impound and raffle tents, hammered countless stakes and yards of caution tape to keep the spectators a safe distance away, and give us our pit areas.

Registration: Joe Hass (no – not our President – his son) stepped up to the task of registration. With our new web based database, I was able to provide Joe with an automated listing of the preregistered pilots. He took it from there – preparing the pilots packets, and handling the on site registration activities with the help of some Skymasters.

Impound: Ron Sokacz managed the Frequency board and impound tent, insuring the safe use of frequencies and transmitters throughout the event.

Flight Control: Roger Schmelling coordinated the Flight Control board, making sure pilots had the opportunities to fly that they wanted. This was our 4th (at least) year with this system which has greatly reduced the people required to run and allowed pilots as much flying time as they wanted.

Retrieval: Wade Wiley and Al McGee provided the power boats, the Thuringer's and I provided the kayaks for close in retrieval, and many volunteers manned the boats throughout the weekend. A necessary component for successful float flying!

Cloud 9 Café: The Dezur and Weaks families coordinated the eats for the days with their computerized café and helpful staff. Serving an abundance of food and drink throughout the weekend to the hungry pilots and spectators.

Pig Roast: Those that joined us for dinner Saturday night were treated to an "all you can eat" Pig Roast catered by **Richardson's Meats**. They again did a wonderful job for us - and the leftovers made some wonderful pulled pork sandwiches on Sunday.

Raffle Sales: Last but certainly not least was **Donna Burns** leading the raffle sales. Donna started selling raffle tickets during the 1997 float fly, and has been 'hired' ever since... This years sales exceeded last years by almost 14%, and represents our highest sales ever! Thank you to Donna and all that assisted!!

The emphasis for this event is sport float flying – to come out and fly... and that is what happens for most of the two days. A wide range of planes... from gremlins to beautiful scale ships to some very unique designs. We draw pilots from across the region – US and Canada. This year included pilots from Michigan, Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Wisconsin, and Ontario Canada. Many bring several planes with them.

This year we brought back the past format used for judged events – for those choosing to compete. Entries were in three categories, Sport, Stand-Off Scale, and Scale. The judges gave both a static and flying score with criteria matching the category (impressive looks and flying for Sport to scale details and realistic flight in the Scale category). In the past, participants built planes specifically to compete in this event. We are looking to achieve that again. The winners this year were:

Sport: Pete Foss won with his "Miss Hangar One" boat/plane. A truly unique sight to see as the boat races across the water, then takes to the air and flies. I think you will be seeing more of these around...

Standoff Scale: Mike Cisler took the honors here with his Smith Miniplane – scratch built from enlarged plans. Mike has been a 15 year attendee at our event!

Scale: Jim Held won this category with his beautiful PBN Mariner. A beautiful scale finish and realistic flight insured top honors.

Each of our winners were rewarded with a 6 channel radio system! Start planning your entry for next year!!

Our Super Prize Raffle has always attracted a lot of attention. This year we offered a DeHavilland Beaver from Kondor Model Products, fully assembled and complete with a Saito 1.80 and Hitec Optic radio. Ron Sokacz did

most of the assembly work on the plane. The plane was intended as the subject of a review to have published (see note below) – so it was test flown and photographed in both wheels and floats configurations prior to the event. The Beaver was won by our own Wade Wiley!! (Wade has already had the Beaver flying at our field!) Second prize was a Top Flite P-51 ARF in the box. This prize went to Oliver Fuchs. The raffle is our largest money maker at this event...

Our pilots drawings gave away many prizes donated by manufacturers and businesses. Joe Hass and I were the prize solicitors this year. With the national coverage our event has had, we have been able to acquire many donations. In today's world of email and mass mailing, the manufacturers receive a deluge of requests for prizes. We are very fortunate to be able to receive what we do. I would ask that if you won something - especially the larger prizes - that you take a minute to write and say thank you for supporting our event. (I can provide a contact name/address if needed.) This goes a long way in continued donations! See the photo of the banner displayed throughout the event thanking our sponsors.

This year we had some guests from RC Air World – a print and DVD magazine in Japan. They attended both days shooting video and interviewing pilots, and expect to publish our event. They will be sending me information when available, and I will pass it on!

In support of the victims of hurricane Katrina, we sold some rubber powered airplane kits, and collected donations. This resulted in a \$185 donation to the Salvation Army, and \$100 donation to the American Red Cross to help with the disaster relief efforts.

We are already talking about the 2006 event – if you have any comments or suggestions from what you have seen, please give me a call.



SKS Video (see note below) has already confirmed they will be joining us for another video! Expect to see them joining us every other year.

Thank you once again to all that helped make this event a success... from a fun weekend of flying, to profit for the clubs treasury... Hope you enjoy the photos!
