

Events:

Loop da loop – Intermediate & Senior pilots must do ten loops, Time starts at the beginning of the first loop and ends with the end of the last loop. Expert pilots must do 5 inside loops and 5 outside loops, time starts at take off and ends at landing for expert.

What's a Immelman? – Takeoff and perform the following maneuvers (Split-S, Immelman, 3 rolls, 3 loops) in any order. For the intermediate & Senior class take offs and landings will not be timed. The clock will start when the plane is up in the air and the pilot verbally says go. The clock will end when the pilot has successfully completed the routine. For the expert class, the clock will start when the plane leaves the ground and the clock will end when the plane touches the ground.

Fly the bases – This is a timed event. The pilot must taxi his plane over home plate to start clock, then go to first, second, and third, finally taxing the plane back over home plate . After the plane crosses home you will then pop a balloon to stop the clock. Experts must leave the ground between bases.

Scoring – If there are ten pilots each event will be worth a possible ten points. The winner of an event will receive ten points. Second place will receive nine points

etc... There will be 3 groups Expert, Intermediate & Senior, (over 60)

May 10th Club Meeting

Attendance:

33 people were in attendance.

2 guests in attendance from other clubs. New members: Dennis Battisti, John Collins

Club President Joe Hass opens the meeting: Greg Charbeneau is in Alaska but sends his regards. Al McGee will not be selling fuel this year. Greg Cardillo has the cover of RC Report. Club financials will be on the agenda and photo's from the work day are on a table at the meeting.

The club invited Alexander Jefferson Lt. Col., USAF, Ret. Back to talk some more about his experiences, sign his book and for a special presentation: Lt. Jefferson was drafted. As a cadet he made 75 a month, as a Lt. he made 150 a month. Mr. Jefferson is a self professed nerd. He said he grew up in a Polish neighborhood in Detroit. He said he spent a lot of time by himself building model boats. He always wanted to be a fighter pilot.

Black men have been fighting for the US since the civil war. 100,000 men fought in the civil war. Two regiments were kept after the war and were called the Buffalo Soldiers. The Buffalo Soldiers were tasked with killing Indians. Mr. Jefferson found this information out when he was teaching school. Lt. Jefferson felt that he was riding on the back of many black soldiers. He said he had to fight for the right to fight.

In 1945 at Freewood Field in Indiana 100 black officers were arrested trying to get into the officers club. A reprimand went into their records until 10 years ago. Colman Young wanted to leave it in his record so it wouldn't be lost. The Red Tails may be the only group flying P-47's to sink an enemy destroyer. Red tails also knocked down 3 ME 262's.

After leaving the service, Parke Davis would not hire Lt. Jefferson. The stated reason given to Mr. Jefferson was "over qualification". So he became a school teacher. There are about 200 Tuskegee airmen left. They all get together each August. This year they are thinking of getting together in Hawaii.

Joe Hass presented Lt. Jefferson a first ever lifetime membership to Skymasters. Joe also presented Lt. Jefferson a brand new Hanger 9 P-51 trainer to learn RC. The P-51 was redone *(by Jim Held)* to match the customary red tail of the Tuskegee airmen.

Financial Report: Joe Haas went through a detailed income and balance sheet for the club.
