PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE...

Mark Smith will be hosting both the Club Fun Fly on July 9th and the Inter Club Fun Fly (at the PMAC field) on July 22. Both events are easy going and a lot of fun. Any skill level can participate so come on out.

The Aerobatic Symposium with Andrew Jesky was a huge success. More knowledge on trimming, set up and flight techniques was shared in the first half hour than I have learned in a lifetime. Andrew flew my SIG Extra 300 (an airplane I thought was pretty well trimmed) and in less than 3 minutes identified thrust and programming issues. The programming was easy to do and improved the flying on the spot. The right and down thrust had to be done at home but when completed dramatically improved the flight envelope. Andy helped numerous other pilots with their airplanes and flight techniques regardless of the type of aircraft they were flying. But the best part was his flight demos. WOW! I have seen the stills and the videos of these high performance birds. But seeing one up close and personal was just awe-some.

The Small Fry, Electric and Sailplane event was hosted by Pete, Carolynn and Sam Foss. With great weather there was an equally great turnout. Pete will have more details in his report.

Student Nights are in full swing with plenty of people and planes. EVERYONE please remember to say hello to our visitors and guests. If someone shows up with an airplane and you fell uncomfortable providing assistance please make sure that they get matched up with an instructor ASAP.

The above paragraph is more than just being courteous. The board has continued to review the financials and your input. Some of the things we have heard.....

"Some members do all of the work. We should have a task point system to reward those who work and penalize those that can't / won't put in the sweat equity". We discussed this at great length. Every organization has its workers and volunteers. Thanks to all of you! But the accounting and tracking of such a system would be a huge burden on the treasurer. I know this from another organization that I belong to that has a third of the members. And what we do for the member that pays dues but only uses the field once a year.

"A dues increase will hurt those on a fixed income". We are very sensitive to this concern, especially because these are the same people who do so much of the work. We already have a dual rate system for Junior members and it greatly complicates the accounting. A third accounting system would again be another burden.

"Why do we have to pay for any of the meals / hotel for our speakers? They should be willing to pay their own expenses to visit us. Why do we open up our meetings to other clubs? Sometimes non Skymasters win the prizes". We have speakers that no other club in the country gets simply because we are willing to promote the hobby so well. We get these industry experts because of our reputation and willingness to work with them. It is also interesting to see what we get throughout the year. For example our recent electric event had a prize for every participant with one company donating over \$600.00 in prizes. No club money was spent on prizes. Please also note that many of the hotel and meal bills were covered by members personally paying for the costs of our guests.

Everyone likes our events and speakers. No one wants a dues increase. Since our fixed costs remain

relatively stable it is clear that an increase in paying adult membership will improve our cash position without a dues increase. So what should we do? Go back up a couple of paragraphs. POTENTIAL MEMBERS ARE COMING TO US! Let's make sure we welcome them, help them and get them to join us fast. A healthy increase in membership will reduce the need for dues increase. Gary Weaks reports that our member base is shifting to the Orion / Oxford area. To those that live in the area, remember to tell your friends to come out and learn what Skymasters are all about.

We have been approached by a local farmer to plant soy beans around the perimeter of the field and decorative corn east of the road to the power lines. He understands that some of the crops may be damaged as we retrieve airplanes. The soy beans are most interesting as they will be lower in height and all the thistles and things will be eliminated. Also, the cost of bushwhacking will be reduced or eliminated. More as this unfolds.

We have a plumbing problem at the field. But it is easily fixed. Please keep the lid down in the out house.

We have made arrangements for free wood chips for the area under / around the shelter. The problem is we don't have any idea when they will be delivered. If you show up and find a large pile of fresh wood chips you will know what to do.

A number of members have asked about changing the club logo. The board has reviewed the suggestion and had decided to keep the things as they are. There are a number of reasons. The most pressing is that we have established recognition based on the current logo and don't want to jeopardize that identity.

SINDING TOURS

Events:

Loop da loop — Intermediate & Senior pilots must do ten loops, Time starts at the beginning of the first loop and ends with the end of the last loop. Expert pilots must do 5 inside loops and 5 outside loops, time starts at take off and ends at landing for expert..

What's a Immelman? — Takeoff and perform the following maneuvers (Split-S, Immelman, 3 rolls, 3 loops) in any order. For the intermediate & Senior class take offs and landings will not be timed. The clock will start when the plane is up in the air and the pilot verbally says go. The clock will end when the pilot has successfully completed the routine. For the expert class, the clock will start when the plane leaves the ground and the clock will end when the plane touches the ground.

Fly the bases — This is a timed event. The pilot must taxi his plane over home plate to start clock, then go to first, second, and third, finally taxing the plane back over home plate. After the plane crosses home you will then pop a balloon to stop the clock. Experts must leave the ground between bases.

Scoring – If there are ten pilots each event will be worth a possible ten points. The winner of an event will receive ten points. Second place will receive nine points etc... **There will be 3 groups Expert,**




