Attendance: 98 people were in attendance.

Club President Joe Hass opened the meeting.

Guest Speakers Captain Edward Glucklick – B24 Pilot, Captain Phil Fine B25 Navigator, Lt. Colonel Alexander Jefferson P51 Pilot.


The symposium for the January 31st meeting was a panel style question and answering session with three WWII aviation veterans. I was able to capture a portion of the conversation, but this is by no means a complete for 100% accurate account of the discussion.

Phil Fine was born in Detroit on Cooley. Phil enlisted in the navy on Dec 8 1941. He said the Navy didn't want him. The Army wanted him to gain weight, but the Air force took him without need for immediate physical alterations. The first airbase he was assigned to was in India. Phil was asked if he was ever shot during combat. Bill laughed and said "Lots of people shot at me", "Mostly ground fire". He did a total of 66 missions. Most of his flying was done in Burma. Phil said the B25 was not a pretty aircraft, but it was tough. The top speed was about 230 mph with cruising at around 125 mph.

A question was asked about how the Air force navigation was done. Phil's answer was "mostly a prayer" Col. Jefferson: said most of the navigation on his missions was done via dead reckoning. Usually they stayed in pairs. Some times they would stay behind to bring damaged planes back.

Col. Jefferson commented on how fast things happened in the air. On his fourth or fifth mission his flight leader shot down 3 ME 109s.

Ed: The first airplane he flew was a PT-19. His first instructor told him it was easy to kill yourself. He said all you have to do is do something a little stupid. Ed's instructor took care to show him a few stupid things. After that Ed said he was convinced of the need to be careful. Flying in combat is very surreal. It's very cold at 20,000 feet with tons of gear on. It's easy to view it as an unreal experience. You don't have a good feel for what your doing to the folks on the ground.

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Questions were asked about the length of the missions. All three men agreed that the missions could be very long. One of the guest speakers commented that you didn't want to drink coffee prior to a mission. Phil commented that the B25 had a chemical toilet in the rear. The rule was the first person to use it had to clean it when you got back to base. Nobody wanted to go to the bathroom because they didn't want to clean the facility.

The maps in Burma or French Indochina (Vietnam) were not very accurate. The shorelines were pretty good. But mountain elevations were very bad. Mountains could be off by 2 or 3 thousand feet.

Phil: Guys would count 2 or 300 holes in the planes and still the plane flew and nobody got hurt. The sorties where flown under the general rule, "one pass and haul A%^". Ed commented that flying a B24 in formation was a job and a half. All he was doing was concentrating on keeping the proper distance between planes. There was no relaxing during the flight.

Joe Finkelstein: Roy Vaillancourt 1/5 scale Focke Wulf FW 190. This plane is a fantastic work in progress.

Ross Jones: Stinson from a Royal kit he purchased at the Toledo auction in the bones. He spent time making it lighter. Covered in Coverite and latex paint. 14lbs.

Pete Foss: B24 F7A that flew out of India to Tokyo. Jack Stafford Kit with balsa and foam wings. 12.5 lbs. with 4 OS FP 25, finished with Perfect paint. She **will** fly someday - Pete.

Chris Hass: E-flite BYP Yak 3D ARF biplane.

Joe Hass: Andrew Jesky Extra 300s 3D Parkflyer ARF

John Hakala: Prototype Vintage bush plane Fokker super universal. Used in northern Canada and Alaska. It had a 50' wingspan.
