PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE...

Welcome to spring flying. I have been out to the field on occasion and it seems pilots are already enjoying some fine weather with the sticks in hand. I know some people don't like flying in the spring because it can be rather windy. I have already braved some 10 to 15 mph winds and it really wasn't that bad. I was glad I took the time to get out to the field and get some flying in. I found myself enjoying the time working on wind corrections.

If there is one thing I really like about the RC hobby it is the diverse areas that can be explored. I have been talking to different members and each person I talk to seems to have a different niche of the hobby they want to concentrate on this year (electrics, float flying, fun flying, helicopters, IMAC, pattern, scale, and even some control line). This year, I want to concentrate on the quality of my flying so I have signed up to compete in IMAC. I have only one goal. I want to be able to fly the basic sequence correctly.

As your club president, I have very different goals. I want the field to be a facility were all the members can come and fulfill their flying needs. Unfortunately, it's difficult for us to accomplish this goal when different types of aircraft are using the field for different purposes. In the interest of avoiding conflict between pilots, I want you to think from the perspective of people you are sharing the field with. For example, every Wednesday between Memorial Day and Labor Day it's student night. On student nights, the people learning to fly RC have a different set of needs that should be taken into consideration. It will make students nervous when pilots deviate from the pattern so please try and avoid flying 3D, or helicopter hovering directly in front of students.

I realize that we have some excellent pilots in the club with the capabilities to avoid a trainer regardless of their aircraft's orientation. Most accomplished RC pilots look at their aircraft and decide what they want it to do without even realizing their fingers are moving the sticks. In a student's mind the fact that any plane is in their line of flight (or sight) can be a problem. Most students are trying to think through stick movements, so any distraction can get ugly.

Weekends can also host a busy flight line of more experienced pilots. Please talk to the pilots around you and communicate what type of flying you want to do. Some people may want to practice 3D or IMAC sequences, while others may want to fly the pattern with an occasional roll or loop. The key to doing this successfully without aggravating each other is communication. Please remember, if your particular type of flying is aggravating everyone around you, you will probably have to stop and be confronted about your actions. On the other hand, if another pilot is clearly being selfish, then you need to be appropriate and respectful when you confront the person. I encourage all of you visit the Information Menu on the Skymasters web site for clarification of our flying site rules. Safety is always the most important aspect of our hobby and the field rules are in place to facilitate a safe environment for all. I also hope you enjoy the camaraderie of the club members. I truly believe that it's the people make Skymasters a great club.

Thank you to all who dedicated their time in the Bald Mountain Involvement Day. I feel a bit guilty for missing it this year but I promised Alyssa I would take her to the IMAC judging seminar. We learned a lot about what will be expected of us as pilots and judges. The seminar was a class operation from start to finish. I personally recommend it to anyone interested in flying IMAC Scale Aerobatics. It's a great way to get your feet wet. It's also a good exercise for experienced IMAC pilots to review the scoring rules.

Our field opening party will be on May 12th this year and I will be there ready to pitch in. This year we will be building a couple more airplane stands and finishing up the rest of the painting. We are still working towards securing a small section of the field on the south side of the shelter for a dedicated helicopter field. Past experience tells me this will be a slow process with the State. It would have been nice to have permission to use the second field in time for the cleanup party, but I just don't think it will happen that soon. I won't give up on this. I think it's the right move for our club. The second field is unused and I believe it will be safer to separate fixed wing and rotary aircraft in separate airspaces.

Horizon at Ultimate Soccer

David Wendt opened the meeting and asked for those in attendance to identify which clubs they represented. David introduced our special guests from Horizon Hobby: Pete Bergstrom - Category Manager Air Team, Bill Brundle - Senior Product Developer, Roy Alojado - Air Brand Manager and Jennifer Mazuera - Associate Brand Manager.

After a short review of the upcoming new program for State Park fees starting October 1, David recognized four individuals responsible for the weekly success of the recent indoor flying season at The Ultimate Soccer Arena. They were Jim Held, Roger Schmeling, Ron Sokacz (not present), and Fred Engelman. They were each presented with a plaque and a gift certificate. David then recognized several of our sponsors for the recently completed indoor season at The Ultimate Soccer Arena. They were: Flightline Hobby – John Hoover, Prop Shop – Matt Brubaker, Air Land Sea Hobby.com – Ross Wegryn-Jones, Ready To Fly Planes.com – Dan Schwartz, Hobby Lobby – Jason Cole, Hobbico, Horizon and Nankin Hobby – Chris Wrigley. David informed the audience that Nankin Hobbies will rebuild after the devastating fire.

David then asked Joe Hass to introduce our special program for the evening. Joe began by introducing Red Bull representative John Griffin from their Marketing Department. John talked about the upcoming Red Bull Air Races on June 5/6. He also proposed an upcoming event locally with aero modelers that will allow us to earn some rewards. Details will be announced later.

Joe Hass thanked the aero modeling community for our support of his son Chris over the years and then very proudly (and rightfully so!) recognized Chris for qualifying for the Electric Tournament of Champions (ETOC). Chris will compete in ETOC which is held in conjunction with the annual Toledo trade show.

Joe also made a special presentation to George Dederian, our host at Ultimate Soccer Arenas, thanking him for allowing us to fly during the winter months. George shared with us some of his potential expansion plans for The Ultimate Soccer Arena. We are very fortunate to be able to fly indoors in this world class facility.

Joe Hass then introduced the Horizon representatives who gave us a sneak preview of some of their Toledo Show products. Some of the products they discussed were:

Hangar 9 Taylorcraft ARF – This aircraft was superbly detailed and easy to assemble. It was designed around a Zenoah 20cc engine and weighed 15-16 pounds with a street price of \$549. One interesting bit of information shared with us concerned engine cooling and cowl design. Keep in mind the inlet/exhaust area should be a 1/3 to 1/5 ratio.

Hangar 9 P-51 ARF – This aircraft is a follow-on to the PTS P-51 Mk II. It is designed to accept Robart retracts

and operational flaps as an option. If the Robart retracts are used, it takes 5-6 psi per cycle and the air tank is filled to 100psi. They indicated you can safely get 8 cycles per tank fill. And if you install the newly released .60 small case Evolution, it really goes..... Street price is \$199.

E-Flite LR-1a Pogo – This is a great little electric sport racing airplane mated with a Power 15 motor which will propel it at 80-85 mph with a 3S battery. If you really want to go fast, use the new Power 25 motor with a 4S battery and you will generate 15,000 rpm at 110 mph. It will be available in mid-May with a street price of \$139.

Percival Mew Gull ARF from Seagull Models -

This airplane is very attractive and good quality with a street price of only \$249. It can be either nitro or electric and flies very well with 4 channels. John Hoover of Flight Line Hobby brought a kit for everyone to examine.

AT-6 Texan from Seagull Models – This is a 120 size aircraft and comes with a fixed gear. Retracts will be available in the future. This is not the traditional model AT-6 Texan. In other words, it flies great!

Carden Yak 54 – Dan Craig's 50cc Yak 54 was displayed and Horizon discussed some of the impressive capabilities of this aircraft. We look forward to seeing Dan compete with this aircraft in the coming months.

Twin Otter ARF – This is a new twin that can be either electric (Power 25 motors) or nitro (Evolution .36's or Saito .40's). Unlike many twins, the Twin Otter flies well on a single engine and is modeled after a plane based at the Air Force Academy used for skydiving. Street price is \$479. John Hoover from Flightline Hobby also brought a Twin Otter ARF kit for display.

Extra 300 – Although not displayed, this is a new aircraft for a Power 32 engine.

Sukhoi SU-26XP – This is an upgrade to their current Micro foam Sukhoi and has a May release. It has a larger battery and a different prop which should make for a great performing aircraft.

Saito 180 and Saito 82 – These are two new great looking gas engines which are very miserly on the fuel. One interesting bit of information shared with us concerns cooling. Horizon and the developers were having trouble with the cooling of the Saito 180. They determined if they used a metal motor mount, this was enough of a heat sink to solve the problem.

Evolution .60 engine – This is a small case (in a .46 case) short stroke glow engine that weighs just 13.5 ounces or 16 ounces with a muffler. It will turn a 10X7 prop at 15,300 rpm.

JR 11X radio system – This new radio has some long awaited features and should be available in the May/June timeframe. It has fully assignable switches, software upgradability, 30 model memory plus unlimited model memory with a standard SD card, and is half the price of the 12X which translates to \$750.

JR 9503 – This radio is an upgrade from the 9303 with a street price of \$599.

Blue Block After Run Oil – Horizon discussed with us the importance of using after run oil. 70% of their service center repairs are bearing related and could be prevented by using after run oil.

Last year Horizon introduced 25-35 new aircraft across the ParkZone, E-flite, Hangar 9, and Blade brands.

Fred Engelman won \$41 in the 50/50 drawing. Horizon Hobby provided a number of bottles of Blue Block After Run Oil which were given to attendees via a drawing. Horizon Hobby also provided the grand prize which was a Saito 82 FG-14B gas engine. The lucky winner was Tom DeClercq from the Frankenmuth Aero Modelers.

The next meeting is April 14 and will feature ICBIM Products with Larry Berman (engine gaskets) and Mark Freeland with Retro RC.


