This month's column is dedicated to the "front office", a.k.a., the cockpit. Whether it is an open biplane or a tightly closed airliner, some of the interior is usually visible from the outside and can affect the overall look of your scale model. There are several choices to make here that depend on how much scale detail you decide to include on your model. Under AMA contest rules the interiors are judged in only some categories. However, in flight, if the pilot would be visible, there must be a pilot figure in the plane. Under IMAC rules, a 3D pilot figure and instrument panel must be visible. I agree with the use of a pilot figure for any scale airplane. They just don't look good in the air sans an occupant.

Cockpit depth is a decision you need to make early in the planning and construction of your plane. The "floor" of the cockpit will determine the placement of functional, but non-scale equipment such as servos and pushrods. Any full depth cockpit requires ample planning to accommodate all of the servos and other equipment. Sometimes compromises must be made. Such a compromise provided a functional benefit to me in my T-28. In the photo of the cockpit, you can see that the model's fuel tank is slightly visible near the pilot figure's feet. This allows me to check my fuel consumption after each flight and does not detract much from the scale appearance.

Instrument panels are a big feature of the interior. Many kits and pre-

fabricated panels are available.

Some can be pricey. There are several easy and fun ways to construct a panel. The easiest is to find a picture of a suitable instrument cluster on the internet. Print it out at the appropriate size for your model. Paste it to a balsa backing and you have a nice 2-D panel to bring an otherwise bland interior to life.



If your model has a highly detailed exterior, then you may want to consider a 3-D instrument panel with bezels, knobs and switches. I have found a quick way to punch out bezels and lenses for instruments: It starts with Creatology TM brand adhesive backed foam available from most craft stores. It is available in black and 1/8" thickness. Using sharpened brass tubes of various sizes and a hammer, I can punch out bezels and lenses quickly. The self adhesive backing makes assembly easy. However, I always add a touch of glue to make sure it stays in place, especially with a glow or gas engine. I like to use Formula[™] 560 aliphatic canopy glue because it dries with a colorless matte appearance and does a nice job with plastic, metal and wood.





Of course when you are collecting instrument pictures to place in your model, be consistent with the aircrafts' period. You don't want colorful instruments and things like a GPS in a WWI cockpit!



I have to share a fun personal story with you. The prototype that I selected for the color scheme on my T-28 is kept at the Pontiac Airport. Having met the pilot/owner we got the planes together for

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some photos. Later, I had the thrill of a lifetime as he took me up in the full-scale T-28 and let me control it from the back seat. In the preflight, he explained the emergency procedures which included the emergency stop button for the electric sliding canopy. This was a prominent button on the face of both instrument panels which I proudly pointed out was included in my model. Although, until that day I did not know the purpose of the big red button!

We presently have a fine group of instructors but it takes several to cover the many hours that our field is open, so there is always room for more.



Continuing an annual tradition, for the 4th year Pete Bergstrom and a team from Horizon Hobby paid a visit to the modelers of southeastern Michigan on Wednesday April 12. The get together was held at Ultimate Soccer Arenas in Pontiac, MI. 126 modelers from 15 different clubs, some traveling over 100 miles joined the festivities.

After recognizing local notables including Ken Myers (Goldberg Award winner and editor of the Ampeer electronic newsletter), John Hoover (owner of Flight Line Hobby) and Mark Freeland (owner of Retro R/C) the meeting began. The first order of business was to thank the staff at Ultimate for another great year of indoor flying. George Derderian and Tom Korpela received a case of wine from the Skymasters to share with their staff. George thanked the modelers who made each week enjoyable. George also mentioned the fact that indoor free flight was now using the facility and a major indoor free flight event was scheduled for Sunday May 6.



Next up was to recognize Roger Schmelling and Fred Engelman for their efforts to run the weekly indoor R/C sessions. On average, 83 modelers were

present each week to fly inside during the winter. That number is larger than many major contests! Roger and Fred managed everything professionally at each session. Roger and Fred each received a new Horizon Gee Bee for their continued dedication.

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



Skymasters Information...

Skymasters field is located within the Bald Mountain State Park on Scripps Road (see map). State Park Permits are required and can be obtained from the Park Headquarters located on Greenshield Road or at club events. Flying is permitted from 10 AM to 8 PM. The noise limit is 94 dBa at 10 feet. This noise rule is strictly enforced.

Wednesday evening is Family Night with flying and a pot luck buffet. Bring something for the grill & a dish to pass.

Thursday 3PM to 8PM is Student Night throughout the summer but there are usually instructors around all day. Meet the instructors and arrange for more instruction time together on other days. Our Chief Flight Instructor is Roger Schmelling, 248-321-7599. From June to August, Club meetings are held at the field, on the second Wednesday of the month at 8 PM. A great chance to fly and socialize. Winter meetings—September to May—are held at Larson Middle School (on Long Lake just east of John R—see map) on the second Wednesday of the month at 7:00 PM. Bring a model for Show and Tell, enjoy coffee with donuts and listen to the speaker of the evening.
