Now, on to some (more) housekeeping and adjustments, in addition to the membership email that I sent the


other day announcing the changes for the gate lock code etc.

The EOC over this past winter has taken a look at our rules and procedures relating to our sign in and pin box at our flying field. I was of the opinion we either need to change the rule or enforce it. After a lot of input and discussion we/I have come to the following conclusion (s). Effective immediately, ANYONE FLYING AT THE FIELD, MEMBERS OR GUEST OF MEMBERS, are required to sign in at the clipboard located near the impound area. I would prefer that mem-





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bers just sign in upon arrival to the field, flying or not, but, it is required for flying members. There are several good reasons for this, and one is that it is required by our lease from the state. This means EVERYONE...

I have tried to think how to best enforce this with long time (adults) members whom I know will resist this (or are not in the habit), and as of yet I haven't come up with any 100% effective enforcement method. I started spreading the rumor that I will confiscate your airplane if I find you flying at the field and haven't signed in, but I would probably end up with too many airplanes... ha-ha! But seriously, I ask us to work together to get us all in this simple habit of signing in each time you get to the field. It shouldn't be that hard and if everyone would just surprise me and do it I won't have to waste any more brain cells thinking of how to get compliance.

Next, another simple but, necessary adjustment. When I joined the club not to many years ago, (4) I was trained to sign in and pull a pin (a clothespin relating to your flying frequency and a (pink) 2.4 one if you were on 2.4 and then to put your membership card in the slot from where you took your pin and put the pin on your transmitter. Then upon departure you would return your clothespin to the box and take your card home. This is still a club rule but we are modifying it a little. Effective immediately, any member flying any aircraft is to have their membership card visible on their person, or visible on their transmitter or flight stand. I prefer that each of us wear their membership card in the small plastic pouch the club will provide that will clip on your shirt or hat. At some point (in the future) we will either provide each member with some sort of membership badge, or,

at the least, next year our membership cards will have our names printed much bigger which will be an added (side) benefit of when wearing your membership credentials, we will be able to see others names. There is a picture of the AVERY #5397 clip style Badge Holders that are NOW available in the pin box. Each member should take (only) one, and place your membership card in it and then wear it when at the field. I appreciate



your compliance and believe me, if it weren't necessary, we would not be doing these things.

Anyway, that's enough of this month's message there is not much more to say other than let's go flying and enjoy the upcoming events! Let's continue to reach out to our visitors and especially our new members and make them feel welcome and a part of the group. Our instructors now have bright red t-shirts that say "Instructor" on them so they should be easy to see when on duty.



It is something many electric flyers take for granted.... you just connect your charger to a source of 12V and charge your packs, right? Well.... yes..... and no.

The 12V part is easy......
most chargers accept 12V
as an input, so any 12V
supply will do. Car battery, deep cycle marine
battery, 120VAC to 12V

converter. But how much current do you need that 12V source to supply? Turns out the answer depends on the number of cells you are charging.

Due to the way our chargers work, the input current is roughly the same as the charge current..... but only when the charge voltage (the pack voltage) is the same as the input voltage. If the pack voltage is less than the input voltage, the input current is less than the charge current. And conversely, if the pack voltage is higher than the input voltage, the input current is also higher than the charge current. Why? Because the charger is supplying POWER to the pack during charge and POWER equals VOLTAGE multiplied by CURRENT.

If you want to do the math, multiply the charge current by the charge voltage. That is the output power. Now divide the output power by the input voltage and that will be roughly the input current (disregarding inefficiency in the charger). As an example, lets use a 45 LiPo pack. At full charge, the cells will be at 4.2V/cell or 16.8V for the pack. Lets say we are charging at 3A. That is $16.8 \times 3 = 50.4$ watts. At 12V to the charger, the input current would be 50.4 / 12 = 4.2 amps. Again, disregarding inefficiency. Add maybe 10% to that current if you want to take power lost in the charger itself into account.

OK, so now you know how to predict the input current. That lets you decide what kind of AC power supply to use at home. But what about charging at the field? Seems simple enough.... just use your car battery, right?

Yes, but you need to take two things into account. First, you need to know how many charges can you expect before your car battery is drained too far to start your car. And second, if you are powering your charger from an accessory socket, you need to know if the charger input current will blow a fuse.

How many charges you can safely expect depends on the cpacity of your car battery. Many car batteries are around 40AH (40 amp hours), so I use that figure when I charge in the field. For a wide safety margin, I try to only discharge my car battery to 50%. That would be 20AH in my case. So I can safely draw 20A for one hour or 10A for two hours or 5A for four hours, etc. In the example above of a 4S pack charging at 3A, that would be roughly five charges at 4.2A for one hour each. Of course, that assumes the pack was totally discharged before charging and we don't fly all the way to zero, do we;) So in our real world, we might be able to get six charges before we removed 50% of the capacity of a 40AH car battery.

Some of you plug your chargers into your vehicle's accessory socket. This is very convenient, especially if your SUV has a socket in the rear. Just keep in mind that many vehicle accessory sockets are rated..... and fused..... at 10A. That 10A rating is easily exceeded when charging larger packs, or when using a charger with multiple outputs. In addition to possibly blowing the vehicle fuse, you need to pay attention to the accessory plug itself. Most accessory plugs are fused internally and when approaching the current rating of that fuse, the fuse gets very hot and the voltage to the charger sags. Better to connect directly to the car battery itself if at all possible.

And of course no discussion of field charging from a vehicle battery would be complete without the usual warning to **NEVER EVER charge IN your vehicle**. If the charger and pack are in or on your vehicle, a battery fire can easily set your vehicle on fire. ALWAYS charge at the end of cables that are long enough to place the charger and pack outside the vehicle. 'Nuff said, OK? Have fun and charge safely,



For those participating we ask that you:


- Bring something for the grill enough to at least feed you and your quests

Flying hours:

QUIET ELECTRICS ONLY from 8AM to 10AM and 8PM to 10PM. The noise limit is 80dBa at ten feet.

Regular flying is permitted between 10 AM to 8 PM. The noise limit is 94 dBa at 10 feet. These noise

limits are enforced.

Wednesday evening (through August) is Family Night with flying and a pot luck buffet. Bring something for the grill & a dish to pass.

Wednesday 5PM to 8PM is also Student Night (through August)
